≠ Judicial Branch Report

Chief Justice Stillion

Chief Justice Stillion: This is one of those days where you can get tired of me guys. I know it's real hard. And I try to get there every meeting, but I got a lot to talk about today. First thing, just to clarify the grievance process from the meeting a couple weeks ago, we heard a little bit of questions about why in particular we presented the grievance opinion to you all, what that meant. Was a real grievance or not. That was a real grievance, and our rationale for presenting the grievances to you as the legislative branch is to ensure that you, as the representatives, are aware of what essentially the court rules in the decisions, especially because of the past couple years, the majority of our decisions have included a recommendation for an amendment or a different interpretation of our governing documents. If we were just to post those on the website or publish them like the most courts actually do, I very, I very highly doubt that anyone would actually read them, because our website, it gets traffic, but probably not on that specific page. So that is our process going forward. We amend the grievance process once a semester, so that's always something we're going to look at to see if that's the best way to keep people all informed about the decisions we make as a judicial branch. But are there any questions about that before I move on to the other thing? Awesome. So, we do have one. An elections grievance. We'll be hearing one next Tuesday. Don't ask me about that because once again, I don't know. If you have any questions, I can direct them up to Executive Justice Reimer. We voted to hear that on Tuesday and we'll be hearing that next meeting. And we're also working through our January and February newsletter, for those of you that are committee heads, might not have gotten an email about that specifically yet, but you will soon. That is working in conjunction with our website updates that did receive information about last week. So definitely keep an eye on our emails for

that. Start thinking about some of the things you have accomplished in the past month. So, we can put those in our newsletter. With our source work, we also have received 5 new student requests so far. I think actually six, that one we haven't reached out to yet, because it was earlier this week. Elections Chair Stillion

Elections Chair Stillion: Just for the minutes. We swapped DLT reports. I will be giving it next week. because it's vice week. I'm innocent. But, uh, so I have, once again, quite a bit to talk to you about. For the regular election cycle, it was not fun. Petitions did close, the candidates we'll be posted on the USG Instagram next week. But it is public outside of that campaigning for the regular election cycle continues until 3/19 the week before spring break, that Thursday at 5 PM, our presidential event has been rescheduled. To a later date. Uh, but with that, a special presidential election will occur as per the passage of the special election rules. The reason we need to run a special election at this point is because we do not have a presidential or vice presidential candidate. And as an organization, like any student organization on this campus, is required that we have a presidential and vice presidential person to continue existing as an organization, especially as a governing body. So the remedy for that solution, for that problem is running another election, because you cannot appoint the president, like you can any other position. So, we, pending the passage of the special election rules, will be immediately reopening the application only for presidential tickets, and running in a slightly expedited election cycle, through the middle of April, only for presidential tickets. There will be two election cycles going on at the same time before the month of March. The regular election cycle ends 3/19. It is

projected, our beautiful timeline that we planned entirely in one day on Monday that the special election cycle will end. I don't know the date. Oh, April 8, at 5 p.m. That is the 2nd Wednesday of April. I think. Yes, 2nd Wednesday of April. That is when the special election is projected to end. So, for the next 3 weeks, including spring break, we will be in two election cycles at the same time. That doesn't mean you get another report for me, though. There's just gonna be two sections of this report, one type of regular election, the other type of special election.

Elections Chair Stillion Presents Current Election Procedure

Senator Shelton: Motion to enter debate.

Senator Prough: Second.

Motion to enter debate Passed: The ayes have it.

Senator Spears: Alrighty. So back, uh, in December, we had this, uh, same conversation about the same thing. My opinions haven't really changed, but I actually have numbers this time that I think would be, you know, better and I actually want to promote something that would be a compromise between the 2 beings that happen in the summer. So, when we added the addition of 25, that was an increase of 33% for our Senate candidates. It was a 12.5% increase for president and vice-presidential candidates. If you applied, the center increased to the presidential ticket, it would require the president to give 267 signatures. If you applied the presidential one to the senators, it would have been only 85, or only a 10-petition increase. Actually, online, university increased its enrollment from the fall, fall 25 by 3.4%. Um, I think it would be a good compromise because I respect the idea that we need to be more representative of the student body. I mean you'd go talk to more students. If there are more students on campus. to around that 3.4% up to 4% and require, well, if this was an election of senators, to have 78, but since it's just a special election for the President, Vice President, to get that number to 208. That would be an increase of 4%, matching an increase of the student body. And I think this would allow us to go in front of more students, accomplish what we wanted to accomplish, but I think it's a reasonable increase for petitioning period. I think we see a problem with students not engaging with USG. We had open positions all year. We continue seal positions. I think it would be better if we had

more students in USG, more students in USG allow for more student interaction in USG. So,
